But This year, 2022, the monsoon season produced highly unprecedented rainfall resulting in devastating floods and landslides, affecting millions of people, in all four provinces, GB and AJK affecting 20% of Pakistan population. The country has never seen such flood disaster at this intensity.

These floods took valuable human lives and caused huge losses to hoses, infrastructure, agriculture and livestock and all other components of society and economy.

Collection of Donations

HRDN collected donations from philanthropist, students, and other groups: of the society to provide support: to flood victims. These donations were used to purchase various necessary items. These all things were provided to poor and vulnerable people, both directly and through HRDN organizational members, through signing proper MoUs formal Contracts

Mosquito Nets

As people became homeless and even shelter less, most of them were living in open air, and were exposed to herds of mosquitoes and such other predators. To avoid health hazards, especially those for children, mosquito nets were provided to poor families to protect them from various diseases like malaria and dengue. A large number of families benefited from this project.

Health and Hygiene Awareness

Most of Relief organizations were providing food and non food items. There were rising health hazards, mainly due to poor awareness of health and hygiene related matters among the vulnerable groups. HRDN paid attention to awareness of people regarding health and hygiene. This was to avoid any major health disaster and prevent personal health issues.

Collaborations and Partnerships

HRDN contacted its member organizations, already working in flood affected areas, to join hands and work together for the cause of humanity. The professional MoUs and formal contracts were signed with various member organizations to carry out smoothly, the flood rescue and relief activities, and reach the right people.

HRDN implements its various development and Rescue & Relief projects; both independently and in collaboration and partnership with its member organizations. So HRDN has a great advantage of countrywide outreach that is all four provinces, GB and AJK.

On occurrence of this great disaster, resulting from unprecedented floods and creating humanitarian crisis, HRDN like all other responsible organizations, started Rescue and Relief work for the victims of the disaster.

HRDN collected donations from various segments of the society for providing the necessary items to people in flood affected areas. HRDN joined hands with its member organizations already working in those regions.

Almost all HRDN member organization played their role to support flood effectees, especially the vulnerable, women and children. They all did their best possible efforts to support people just for humanitarian causes.

The work of few member organizations is mentioned here.







IRM, a humanitarian organization, responded to the disaster by providing emergency relief assistance to the affected communities. IRM's response included the following actions:

MEDICAL SUPPORT:

IRM provided medical assistance to the affected people by setting up medical camps and providing essential medicines to those in need.

MEDICAL CAMP FOR TRANSGENDER:

IRM set up a medical camp for transgender community during the flood.

• DISTRIBUTION OF RELIEF ITEMS: IRM distributed essential relief items such as food to the flood-affected communities.

RATION DISTRIBUTION:

During the rehabilitation phase IRM distributed ration to impoverished

households in Hyderabad and Jamshoro to help the communities recover from the disaster.

WARM BEDDING:

During the winter season, IRM distributed warm bedding and pillows to the communities in Hyderabad and Jamshoro.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:

IRM worked closely with the local communities to understand their needs and involve them in the relief and rehabilitation efforts.

Overall, IRM's response to the 2022 flood in Sindh was swift, effective, and focused on providing immediate relief to the affected communities. Through its various initiatives, IRM was able to alleviate the suffering of those affected by the disaster and help them rebuild their lives.

SHELTER

NRSP with the financial support of its partner organizations given access to temporary shelters to the affected households. This support included Tents, Tarpaulins and Plastic Sheets; as per the needs of the affected people (identified during the needs assessment exercise carried out by the NRSP teams). Use of Tarpaulins and Plastic Sheets was to protect the temporary damaged rooms by covering walls and roofs; in order to prevent more damage to the property and people belongings (due to continued rains). Besides, Tarpaulins and Plastic Sheets were also demanded by the people to cover toilets. NRSP distributed 4,245 Shelter items among same number of households

FOOD & WATER

Right after emergency and displacement of people, immediately cooked food and clean water for drinking was required. So for first few weeks, NRSP utilized its own resources to extend some support in this regards. Cooked and non coocked food to13,719 affected families, which helped support families to access Non-Cooked-Food for a week or 15 days. These food bags included Flour, Rice, Pulses, Salt, Sugar, Tea, Spices, Biscuits etc.





HEALTH & HYGIENE

Following were health services which NRSP provided

- Distribution of Hygiene Kits among 8,976 families (which included soaps (for washing hands, clothes and crockery), sanitizers
- 178,007 people were screening in medical camps
- Supported over 2,500 pregnant women through health screening, access to relevant hygiene kits and post-natal care
- Distribution of over 1,000 mosquito nets
- Health and hygiene awareness raising sessions



in pertinent to this emergency and catastrophic situation, MRDO initiated its relief work and provided emergency helped those affected relief and initiated immediately. MRDO operation in terms of distribution of Ration bags to fulfil urgent lifesaving households relative of in needs severely affected areas, targeted unconditional food assistance to the affected and most vulnerable households for a limited period, to enable the households to cope with the immediate effects of the disaster.





AHD provided immediate help to people with Food Items, mosquito nets, safe drinking water, and shelter/tents to meet their emergency needs.

The donations to this campaign helped in procurement and distribution of Food items, mosquito nets, shelter/tents, health kits and to raise awareness regarding water-borne diseases. the flood effected communities had food sufficient for 20 to 30 days package via this project and will easily pass the days as they have lost their houses and no proper pale to live. everywhere in Pakistan.













FDO took initiative and after the flood visited DG Khan and Rajanpur and distributed 150 Kits including shelter and WASH items in district Rajanpur and 350 Food Hampers in district DG Khan.

Farmers Development Organization (FDO) is implementing a 5 months emergency project with Catholic Relief Services (CRS) in District Dadu Sindh Pakistan with the financial support of USAID - Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA) in response to widespread flooding with severe repercussions for human lives, food stock, infrastructure, and livelihoods.

The Emergency Assistance for Flood Affected Households project was provided to vulnerable households to meet their basic needs with dignity, prevent the further erosion of household assets, and accelerate recovery, contributing to the further resilience of affected households and communities.

Initially, Rapid Assessment was conducted jointly by FDO and CRS, in 36 villages of District Rajanpur and identified the most vulnerable area in Punjab and Sindh. On the of vulnerability Catholic Relief priority Services (CRS) started a project Emergency Assistance for Flood Affected Households project in District Dadu Sindh Pakistan with the financial support of USAID -Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA).
